# **January Emphasis!**

## **Endowment Fund**

The Endowment Fund is a key international programme of YMI which provides financial stability for the present and future purposes, objectives, programs and expansion of YMI through an investment portfolio.

The fund was created in 1958 and is an international investment account managed by a five-member Board of Trustees. It is supported by Y's Men's Clubs and individuals, holding gifts, donations or bequests in the form of cash or other property for the exclusive benefit of YMI. Donations are directed into an interest-bearing portfolio at the direction the Board of Trustees and overseen by an appointed bank in Geneva. The income on the investments may be made available and provide a source of funding for exceptional programmes and projects such as Special Development Support (SDS).

The EF Promotion programme was created in 1967 to encourage capital contributions to the fund by establishing a system of personalised recognitions for donations of CHF 50 or more. A record of these special contributions is maintained by IHQ staff in Geneva, in what is known as the "Golden Book". The YMI website can be utilised for these contributions and can be accessed by clicking the "Donation" link, followed by "Endowment Fund" link. Some examples are:

The current International Service Director for this program is C.R. Raghunadhan, who has served ably in this position for several years. Area India leads the world in their enthusiasm and support of this fund and for this we are very thankful. Meet one of our leaders on the International Council:

## AREA PRESIDENT—EUROPE, Ulrik Lauridsen



I was born in 1946 and became a member of the Danish Boys
Brigade (FDF) in 1955. Here I was drawn closer to the Christian faith, but my parents were very humanistic and did not attend church. My father owned a furniture factory but passed away when I was 16 years old. My mother became Director for the factory and I helped in between my studies. I attended the military in 1965 as a

volunteer for three years where I received education as a teacher. I was married in 1970 and four children were born in the following 10 years. I started teaching in 1974 in Ringkøbing and this is where I learned about Y's Men. I then became a member of the Y's Men's Club. We were chartered in 1978 and two years later, we chartered a new club close to our city. I served as District Governor and was granted a trip to India as a BF-delegate. This experience started my vision for working more intensely for the Y's Men's movement. In 1986 I became the inspector at a sports high school in Veile and immediately I began attending the local Y's Men's Club in Vejle. I worked at the high school for eight years. Then I moved to a large sports-conference centre where my role was to take care of events for all the groups coming for conferences. In 2012 I retired and now receive my pension but I am still active in a freelance role at the sports centre. Pia has also retired recently which means that we can spend more time travelling and being with family and friends.

In my Y's Men's life I have been President and DG several times, Secretary for the RD, and for five years, RSD for training. As a Y's Man, your duty is to be active and I have had many ideas and visions for the club in Vejle. We became a mother club for a new club in Romania and I was glad that our members became more open-minded for the world outside our own club.

In 2017 I was asked to be a candidate for International Council Member. I accepted and was elected - also as Area President Elect for Europe. My theme for my period as AP is "SMILE AND FELLOWSHIP WALK HAND IN HAND". With that theme my purpose is that the club life means so much for a club. Many clubs in Area Europe do not have regular meetings so I'm trying to implement that especially for clubs in Central East Europe and Russia to understand the importance of having meetings and being together. Here they can use body language – the smile and the gestures – to find out how they are feeling and responding and will learn about each other much better than just using the computer or the mobile. It is hard work, but I hope the clubs will make a yearly programme and meet more often. If you don't experience the fellowship, then your chances of dying out as a club is closer.

My hope for club life, especially in Scandinavia, is that we can survive and flourish. After many years as Y's Men, we have grown older and are not as active as we used to be. We need to think in another way and not always follow the

traditional way of club life. We feel that the younger members don't want to be a member on these conditions. So, in fact, we need to follow IPIP Moon Sangbong's theme from last year "YES, WE



**CAN CHANGE!"** and that will give us a better tomorrow in the future!
